Building a Life in Florida

- ① During the 1800s, pioneers moved into Florida's forests, river areas, and open land. Many traveled by boat, wagon, or on foot because few roads crossed the territory. Families often chose land near water. Rivers and springs supplied drinking water and made travel easier. Settlers cleared trees to build homes and plant crops such as corn, sweet potatoes, and beans.
- ② A pioneer home might be a small log cabin with a fireplace. Family members cut logs, filled gaps with mud, and made simple furniture. Cooking happened over a fire, and water was carried from a spring or well. Most families grew food in gardens and fields. They also hunted, fished, raised animals, or traded for supplies they could not make.
- ③ Life required cooperation and hard work. Children helped with chores such as feeding chickens, gathering firewood, carrying water, and tending gardens. Neighbors sometimes joined together to raise a cabin, share tools, or help after a storm. Florida's heat, mosquitoes, heavy rain, and wet ground could make daily work difficult. Even so, pioneer families created communities with schools, churches, stores, and farms.
