HOW TO RUN THIS PAGE

Model how to tap each syllable, then blend the parts together. This sheet includes closed syllables that end in consonants and open first syllables that end in vowels.

Students never read directions on this sheet. Read each part's script aloud, then each prompt, giving think time before students mark.

PART 1 • CIRCLE WORDS

SAY “Words can have two parts, called syllables. A part ending in a consonant, like pic in pic-nic, is closed, and a part ending in a vowel, like pa in pa-per, is open. Tap the two parts as I read each row, then circle the word the question describes.”

ROW	SAY	STUDENTS CIRCLE
a	I will read rabbit, sunset, and basket in two parts. Which word begins with sun and ends with set? Circle it.	sunset
b	I will read robot, music, and napkin in two parts. Which word begins with ro and ends with bot? Circle it.	robot
c	I will read tiger, picnic, and paper in two parts. Which word begins with pa and ends with per? Circle it.	paper

PART 2 • BUILD WORDS

SAY “Look at the first parts and endings. Which ending makes a real two-part word with each first part? Say the parts together, then draw each line.”

- **nap** matches **kin**
- **ro** matches **bot**
- **mu** matches **sic**

WHAT TO ACCEPT

Correct circles are sunset, robot, and paper. Correct matching lines make nap-kin, ro-bot, and mu-sic.
