HOW TO RUN THIS PAGE

Read each row aloud while students look at the three printed choices. Students listen to a one-syllable word, mentally add, delete, or substitute one phoneme, then circle the word they hear.

Students never read directions on this sheet. Read each part's script aloud, then each prompt, giving think time before students mark.

PART 1 • TAKE AWAY

SAY “Will you listen for the new word after a sound is taken away? Can you circle the word you hear in each row?”

ROW	SAY	STUDENTS CIRCLE
a	Can you say slip? When /s/ is taken away, which word do you hear: sip, lip, or slip? Circle the new word you hear.	lip
b	Can you say track? When /t/ is taken away, which word do you hear: tack, track, or rack? Circle the new word you hear.	rack

PART 2 • SWITCH SOUND

SAY “Will you listen for the new word after one sound changes? Can you circle the word you hear in each row?”

ROW	SAY	STUDENTS CIRCLE
a	Can you say map? When /m/ changes to /t/, which word do you hear: map, tap, or mop? Circle the new word you hear.	tap
b	Can you say rug? When /r/ changes to /b/, which word do you hear: rug, dug, or bug? Circle the new word you hear.	bug

PART 3 • ADD SOUND

SAY “Will you listen for the new word after a sound is added? Can you circle the word you hear in each row?”

ROW	SAY	STUDENTS CIRCLE
a	Can you say top? When /s/ is added at the beginning, which word do you hear: top, stop, or step? Circle the new word you hear.	stop
b	Can you say rain? When /t/ is added at the beginning, which word do you hear: train, ran, or rain? Circle the new word you hear.	train

WHAT TO ACCEPT

Correct circles are lip, rack, tap, bug, stop, and train, in order. Accept any clear circle around the intended word.
