Mapping the City's Trees

- ① On a humid July morning, Maya joins a city tree inventory along a busy block. An inventory is a systematic record, not simply a list, so she notes each tree's species, trunk diameter, condition, and location. Her supervisor asks her to be precise because the data will guide pruning crews and future planting. Maya uses a field tablet with a geographic information system, or GIS, which links each observation to a map. A maple with a cracked limb receives an urgent maintenance code. Nearby, a healthy young oak is recorded as a candidate for protection during sidewalk repairs.
- ② Later, Maya compares the block's records with a planting plan. The plan identifies a canopy gap, an area with too little tree cover, near an apartment complex that becomes unusually hot in summer. To choose a species, the team considers drought tolerance, the ability to continue growing with limited water, and soil compaction, when packed soil leaves little space for air and water. These disciplinary terms help the team discuss biological limits clearly. The report also uses the academic word mitigate, meaning to make a harmful effect less severe. Planting several drought-tolerant trees could mitigate heat on the pavement and improve shade for pedestrians.
- ③ Before leaving, Maya prepares a brief work order for the maintenance department. A work order is a professional document that tells a crew what action is needed, where it is needed, and how soon it should occur. She recommends that an arborist, a trained tree-care specialist, inspect the maple's damaged limb. She does not diagnose the tree from a distance. Instead, she records observable evidence, including the limb's crack and its position above a bus stop. Her recommendation is provisional, meaning subject to change after more evidence is gathered. Clear vocabulary allows staff members with different jobs to interpret the record consistently and respond safely.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

During lunch, I noticed a canopy gap beside the gym. Our crew should document the area in a work order, a report that directs a specific action. Because the pavement becomes hot, we could mitigate heat by planting a species with drought tolerance, the ability to grow with limited water.

Accept accurately marked vocabulary from multiple categories, such as inventory, GIS, canopy gap, drought tolerance, mitigate, work order, arborist, observable evidence, and provisional, if students provide reasonable nearby context clues. For the open response, accept varied scenarios when the word count, vocabulary use, and context clue requirements are met.
