A Creek Cleanup Message

- ① On Saturday, neighbors will meet at Willow Creek Park to remove litter from the stream bank. Bring gloves, a refillable water bottle, and shoes that can get muddy. The work is simple, but its result matters: plastic bags and cans can wash downstream after heavy rain. If you have only an hour, come anyway. Every filled trash bag keeps the creek safer for turtles, fish, and the people who use the trail. Meet at the south entrance at 9:00 a.m.; volunteers will receive bags, grabbers, and a map of the cleanup area.
- ② At the welcome table, check in before you choose a section of the bank. First, sign the safety sheet. Then listen for the team leader's signal, because volunteers must stay clear of the water while trucks collect debris. Do not lift sharp metal, broken glass, or anything you cannot identify. Instead, point it out and call an adult leader. Short directions help a busy group act quickly, especially when wind, noise, and moving equipment make long explanations hard to follow. Work with a partner. Keep your phone charged. Tell the leader when your section is finished.
- ③ City council members can strengthen this effort by funding two more public trash and recycling stations near Willow Creek Park. Why place them there? Because bins near trail entrances give visitors an easy choice before litter reaches the water. The cleanup proves that residents care, yet volunteer labor cannot replace regular waste service. A small investment could protect wildlife, reduce flooding caused by clogged drains, and keep the park welcoming. Please add the stations to next year's parks budget. Clean water is not a luxury. It is a shared responsibility, and this practical step would help the city meet it.

3	What effect does the question "Why place them there?" have on city council members before the writer gives a reason?	It raises a likely concern and prepares council members for the explanation about placing bins near trail entrances.
4	How do the final two sentences of the passage support the writer's purpose of persuading the city council?	The short sentence makes an emphatic claim about clean water, and the next sentence expands that claim into a shared responsibility and practical action.
