Reading an Ancient Site

- ① On a dry morning in 1974, farmers near Xi'an, China, noticed fragments of fired clay while digging a well. Archaeologists soon uncovered rows of life-size soldiers, horses, and chariots made to guard the tomb of Qin Shi Huang, China's first emperor. The figures were part of a vast underground complex. Although each soldier was formed from molds, artists added individual details, such as different hairstyles and facial features. This variation made the army appear less like a repeated decoration and more like a force prepared for duty.
- ② Researchers must establish an artifact's provenance, or its documented history of ownership and location, before drawing large conclusions from it. Provenance matters because an object removed without records can lose clues about who used it and when. At the site, teams also study stratigraphy. In this method, they examine layers of soil, knowing that deeper undisturbed layers are generally older than layers above them. A bronze arrowhead found beside a soldier may seem small, yet its position can help scholars reconstruct activities within the complex and avoid guesses based only on appearance.
- ③ Excavation is not the only challenge. Once exposed to air and moisture, some painted surfaces can deteriorate, meaning they gradually break down. Conservators respond by stabilizing fragile materials so they do not crumble or fade further. They may use noninvasive tools, which gather information without cutting, scraping, or otherwise damaging an object. For example, imaging equipment can reveal cracks beneath a surface. This careful conservation protects evidence for future study, but it also requires patience: researchers sometimes leave an area covered until they have a safe plan for preserving what lies below.

1	What does provenance mean in paragraph 2? Identify one phrase that helped you determine its meaning.	Provenance means an artifact's documented history of ownership and location. The appositive phrase "its documented history of ownership and location" provides the meaning.
2	Use the context in paragraph 2 to determine the meaning of stratigraphy.	Stratigraphy is the study of soil layers, especially to understand their relative ages and what they reveal about a site.
3	What does deteriorate mean in paragraph 3? Which nearby details support your answer?	Deteriorate means to gradually break down or become damaged. The passage says surfaces can "gradually break down" and that materials may "crumble or fade further."
4	What does noninvasive mean in paragraph 3? Explain how the prefix non- supports your answer.	Noninvasive means not damaging or entering an object by cutting or scraping it. The prefix non- means not, and the passage says the tools work without cutting, scraping, or damaging.

The report described a reversible policy, one that could be changed or undone if the data changed. Reversible means able to be changed back, and the prefix re- suggests again or back.
