### A Rain Garden for Our Courtyard

- ① Dear Members of the School Facilities Committee, Our courtyard’s lowest corner turns into a shallow, muddy pond after heavy rain, and students must step around it on the way to the library. I am asking the committee to approve a small rain garden in that corner. A rain garden is a planted basin that temporarily collects stormwater and lets it soak into the ground. Instead of watching brown water spread across the walkway, we could see grasses and flowers move in the wind. This project would make a daily route safer while giving science classes a living place to observe insects and soil.
- ② The design can be modest and practical. The garden would use deep-rooted native species chosen for this site, along with plants that can tolerate both wet and dry periods. Their roots can help hold soil in place, while the basin slows runoff. According to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, rain gardens can reduce runoff by allowing water to soak into the ground. The committee could begin with a plot about the size of two parking spaces and ask the environmental club to help label plants. That scale keeps costs manageable and gives students a visible role in caring for the space.
- ③ Choosing this project now would show that the school plans for problems before they become barriers. The muddy corner may seem small, yet it affects every student who uses the library path during a storm. A rain garden would turn that trouble spot into a place where water sinks, pollinators visit, and students can investigate a local system. Please place this proposal on the agenda for the next facilities meeting. I would be glad to share a sketch of the site and gather student observations before the committee decides.

**PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)**

Dear Principal Rivera, Please approve three covered tables beside the east entrance for students who wait for rides. On rainy afternoons, more than twenty students often crowd beneath the narrow awning, and backpacks press against the glass doors. Last week, a student using crutches had to wait in the rain because the dry space was full. Covered tables would create a calmer, safer pickup area, where rain taps overhead instead of soaking notebooks. They could also serve as outdoor work spaces on mild days. Please add this small project to the spring maintenance plan.

Accept equivalent answers that identify the committee as the audience and use relevant passage evidence. For the open response, accept varied campus proposals if the draft meets the word range and includes a request, two concrete details, imagery, and a clear final action.
