City Falcons

- ① Each spring, peregrine falcons nest on ledges high above city streets. These powerful birds once declined sharply in north America because a pesticide called DDT thinned there eggshells. After DDT was restricted and captive breeding programs began, many populations recovered. Today, a pair may choose a bridge tower or office building because the structure resemble a cliff. From that perch, the falcons watch pigeons and other prey below. A diving peregrine can reach remarkable speeds, making it one of the fastest animals in the world.
- ② Falcons do not build the elaborate nests that many songbirds make. Instead, they lay eggs in a shallow scrape, a small hollow in gravel or soil. The adults take turns keeping the eggs warm, and a nesting pair defend the site from intruders. In cities, wildlife biologists sometimes place gravel in nest boxes to give the birds a safer surface. The chicks hatch after about a month, they remain near the nest for several weeks while their wings strengthen. Parents bring food to the young throughout the day.
- ③ Watching a falcon family can help people understand how wildlife adapts to human made spaces. However observers should stay far enough away to avoid disturbing the birds. A crowded viewing area, loud noises, or a drone can cause stress during nesting season. Local groups often shares updates online, but visitors should follow posted rules and respect closed areas. By learning when to observe quietly and when to leave, people can enjoy a city's wild neighbors without putting them at risk during the busy spring season.
