MEANING MATCHES

The word's root or affix meaning supports the meaning of the sentence. The word fits the context.

The word may be real, but its root or affix meaning clashes with the sentence. The word does not fit the context.

The audience called the speech inaudible because every person heard it clearly.

2	The committee chose to postpone the vote until more evidence was available.	MATCHES	Postpone means to move to a later time, which fits delaying a vote.
3	Because the witness gave a contradictory account, her story agreed with the earlier report.	CONFLICTS	Contradictory means opposing or disagreeing, not agreeing.
4	The biologist studied nocturnal animals that are active at night.	MATCHES	Nocturnal means active at night.
5	The principal praised the student's benevolence, noting that he had acted with cruelty toward a classmate.	CONFLICTS	Benevolence means kindness or goodwill, which conflicts with cruelty.
6	The antidote intensified the poison's effects and made the patient sicker.	CONFLICTS	An antidote works against a poison, rather than increasing its effects.
7	The historian used chronological order, arranging events from earliest to latest.	MATCHES	Chronological means arranged by time order.
8	The submarine rose above the ocean surface, where it remained hidden below water.	CONFLICTS	Submarine means under water, which conflicts with being above the surface.

PART 3 • MAKE YOUR OWN (SAMPLE ANSWERS)

- **MATCHES:** The journalist remained impartial, presenting evidence without favoring either side.
- **CONFLICTS:** The coach called the score reversible because no change could possibly alter it.

Challenge: The coach called the score irreversible because no change could possibly alter it. The prefix *ir-* means “not.”

For Part 2, accept explanations that correctly connect a word part to a context clue. Student-created responses may vary if the constructed word is accurate and its use clearly fits or conflicts with the sentence.
