Mapping the Hottest Blocks

- ① On a July afternoon, researchers in Phoenix, Arizona, walked blocks with small temperature sensors attached to bicycles. Their goal was to map microclimates, small areas whose conditions can differ from those of the surrounding city. A shaded bus stop, for example, may be cooler than an exposed parking lot only a block away. The team recorded air temperature, surface temperature, wind, and shade at the same time. Their first map was provisional because one afternoon of measurements could not show patterns across an entire season. Still, it revealed several unusually hot routes used by pedestrians.
- ② To explain the hot routes, the researchers compared their readings with maps of pavement, trees, and building materials. Dark asphalt absorbed much of the Sun's energy, then released heat after sunset. By contrast, streets with dense tree canopies stayed cooler. The researchers noticed correlations between low shade and high surface temperatures, yet they avoided claiming that one observation alone proved a cause. A neighborhood with few trees might also have wide roads or large roofs. To test competing explanations, the team would need repeated measurements in different weather conditions.
- ③ City planners used the preliminary map to choose places for a pilot project, a small trial before a larger decision. At one transit stop, they considered retrofitting an existing shelter with a wider roof and panels that block direct sunlight. They also considered pale pavement, which reflects more solar energy than dark asphalt. These changes are forms of heat mitigation. They would not eliminate summer heat, but they could reduce a person's exposure while waiting for a bus. Before spending public money broadly, planners would compare temperatures and pedestrian use at improved and unimproved stops.

3	What does retrofitting most likely mean in paragraph 3? Use both retro- and the description of the shelter in your answer.	Retrofitting means changing or adding features to something that already exists. The existing shelter would receive a wider roof and sunlight-blocking panels.
4	What does mitigation most nearly mean in this passage? Which words in the final paragraph help you infer its meaning?	Mitigation means reducing a harmful effect. The clues are that the changes would not eliminate summer heat but could reduce a person's exposure.
