A Proposal With a Plan

- ① Before drafting a proposal to restore the abandoned Riverside Theater, Maya identifies her audience: the city council members who will vote on a preservation grant. They need clear evidence, a realistic budget, and a quick way to compare choices. Her purpose is not simply to celebrate the building's history. She must persuade officials that restoration is a practical investment. Because council members will read many proposals, Maya chooses a formal proposal rather than a personal narrative. She plans to combine concise explanation with charts, using informational and persuasive modes suited to a decision-making audience.
- ② Her opening will state the request and the estimated grant amount, so readers understand the decision immediately. Next, a section on structural condition will summarize an engineer's report, followed by a section on projected costs and funding sources. Maya places benefits, such as jobs and performance space, after the costs because officials may first question affordability. A one-page timeline will show stages from roof repair to reopening. Near the end, she will address likely objections, including parking and ongoing maintenance. The final section will repeat the requested action and identify the vote date. This problem-to-solution structure lets each section answer a concern before moving to the next.
- ③ To make the document usable during a public meeting, Maya will include labeled headings, a table for costs, and a map showing the theater's location and nearby parking. These features are not decoration. Headings help officials locate evidence, while the table makes figures easier to compare than a long paragraph would. The map responds visually to a concern that may arise during discussion. Maya will cite the engineer's report and budget sources in notes, allowing readers to verify key claims. She will avoid dramatic language and unexplained statistics because a formal audience expects precise, credible support. Her organization matches both the proposal's persuasive purpose and the council's limited reading time.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

My audience is the library board, which must decide how to use a small unused room. My purpose is to persuade members to create a teen study room. I will write a formal proposal using persuasive and informational modes, since the board needs evidence as well as a clear recommendation. First, I will state the request and describe the room. Next, I will present student survey results and library-use data. Then, I will compare furniture and supervision costs with possible funding. After addressing noise concerns, I will end with a timeline and requested vote. Headings and a cost table will help board members scan the plan.

Accept answers that accurately connect Maya's choices to the council's decision-making needs and the proposal's persuasive purpose. For the open task, accept varied topics and structures if the student clearly identifies audience, purpose, genre, mode, ordered sections, and a useful organizational feature.
