Draft: Rooftop Falcon Watch

- ① On a spring morning, a group of students stood on the roof of the Riverton library to watch peregrine falcons. The birds had nested on a ledge above the clock tower, where the adults could scan the streets for pigeons. Peregrines are famous for their speed, a hunting dive can exceed 200 miles per hour. As the students raised their binoculars, one falcon circled the building and then landed near its nest. "Its smaller than I expected," Mateo whispered. His teacher reminded the group that young falcons often leave the nest before they can fly confidently.
- ② By noon, the class had recorded four sightings in their field journals. Jamal's notes was especially detailed because he described the falcon's dark hood, pale chest, and pointed wings. He also wrote, "the bird made three short calls before it flew toward the river." The class compared these observations with a guide from the state wildlife agency. Peregrine falcons disappeared from many eastern cities after DDT weakened their eggshells during the twentieth century. Legal protections and captive breeding helped the species recover, however, threats such as window collisions and pesticide exposure still affect some populations.
- ③ Later, the students shared their findings with a city conservation officer. She explained that tall buildings can resemble cliffs, and they gives peregrines high nesting places and open flight paths. The officer asked the class to report injured birds, they should not try to handle a raptor without trained help. "Who should we call if we find one?" asked Aisha. The officer pointed to the wildlife agency's phone number on a poster and said, "Call this number, and describe the injured raptors location." Before leaving, the students decided to create signs that would help library visitors notice the nest without disturbing it.
