How the Harlem Renaissance Took Shape

- ① After World War I, Harlem became a major Black neighborhood in New York City as people arrived during the Great Migration. Its streets held churches, apartment buildings, theaters, and businesses where artists could meet. Writers such as Langston Hughes, Zora Neale Hurston, Claude McKay, and Countee Cullen did not all write alike, but many rejected stereotypes that had long limited Black characters in American literature. They explored Black history, daily life, music, faith, migration, and racial injustice. Their work helped readers see Black culture as varied, modern, and worthy of serious art.
- ② The movement was strengthened by editors, patrons, and gathering places. W. E. B. Du Bois published poems and essays in *The Crisis*, the magazine of the NAACP. Charles S. Johnson, editor of *Opportunity*, sponsored literary contests connected to the National Urban League. These publications gave emerging writers national audiences and introduced them to one another. In Harlem, salons hosted by A'Lelia Walker and events at the 135th Street Branch of the New York Public Library created spaces for debate and performance. Alain Locke's 1925 anthology *The New Negro* gathered many voices under a shared public identity.
- ③ Calling this network the Harlem Renaissance does not mean every participant agreed or belonged to a formal club. Some writers emphasized folk traditions, while others experimented with modernist styles or focused on protest. Yet they worked in a period when segregation, violence, and unequal opportunity shaped Black life, and they used print, performance, and criticism to challenge narrow public images. The label became more durable because readers, editors, and later scholars treated these linked efforts as a cultural movement. By the late 1920s, economic pressures and changing artistic circles altered the network, but its writing influenced later Black artists and activists.

Many writers challenged limiting stereotypes and presented Black culture as complex and worthy of serious art. Evidence may include their attention to Black history, daily life, music, faith, migration, or racial injustice.
2	Explain how magazines, contests, and the anthology helped separate writers become a movement.	The Crisis and Opportunity gave writers audiences and introduced writers to one another, while contests supported emerging writers. The New Negro collected many writers under a shared public identity.
3	How does the passage show that the Harlem Renaissance was a movement even though its writers did not all write in the same style?	Writers differed in style and focus, including folk traditions, modernism, and protest, but they were connected through shared concerns, Harlem institutions, publications, and a public identity.
4	How did the social conditions of the period and the response of readers and editors help define the Harlem Renaissance?	Segregation, violence, and unequal opportunity shaped the writers' concerns and led them to challenge narrow images of Black life. Readers, editors, and later scholars recognized their linked efforts as a cultural movement.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

In 1950s San Francisco, Beat writers including Allen Ginsberg, Jack Kerouac, and Lawrence Ferlinghetti formed a visible literary network. Readings at the Six Gallery and conversations around City Lights Books connected writers with audiences and publishers. They challenged postwar conformity through spontaneous, experimental writing that addressed sexuality, spirituality, travel, and dissent. When City Lights published Ginsberg's *Howl* in 1956 and defended it in an obscenity trial, the publicity helped define their linked work as the Beat movement.
