Public Comment on Shade Access

- ① Councilmembers, the map on the screen is not merely a planning document. It shows where summer heat settles, block after block, over bus stops, playgrounds, and apartment roofs with little shade. In the eastern neighborhoods, residents walk farther from trees and wait longer for buses, often beside wide roads that hold heat after sunset. I ask you to fund shade structures at transit stops and to require canopy targets in major redevelopment projects. This is a practical public-health decision, not an aesthetic extra. A cooler route can change whether an older adult reaches a clinic safely.
- ② The evidence behind this request is straightforward, and it deserves a response with equal specificity. Unshaded pavement absorbs solar energy and can become much hotter than nearby shaded ground on sunny days. That difference matters because heat exposure is not distributed by accident. When a neighborhood has fewer trees, fewer covered stops, and less access to air-conditioned public spaces, its residents carry more of the risk. Fund the pilot before next summer, then publish the locations, costs, and temperature results. Residents should be able to see whether the city's promise reaches the blocks identified on its own map.
- ③ Some may say that trees take too long to grow, or that a shade requirement would slow construction. Those concerns deserve consideration. Yet the proposal does not depend on mature trees alone: it combines long-term canopy goals with covered transit stops that can be installed sooner. Approve a one-year pilot in the hottest transit corridors. Measure conditions before and after installation. Report the results publicly. If the council wants a city that plans for residents rather than averages, it must treat shade as essential infrastructure. The choice before you is limited, concrete, and urgent.

3	What effect do the three consecutive short commands in paragraph 3 have on the council as an audience?	They turn the proposal into clear, immediate steps: approve the pilot, measure conditions, and report results publicly.
4	How does the final sentence, with the parallel words "limited, concrete, and urgent," support the writer's purpose?	The parallel descriptions make the decision seem manageable, specific, and time-sensitive, encouraging the council to act.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Board members, students who share crowded homes need a reliable place to read, research, and meet with tutors after classes end. Although the library already serves many students during the day, its current closing time excludes athletes, students with jobs, and those who ride late buses. Keep the library open two additional hours, four evenings each week. Start with a semester-long pilot. Track attendance, tutoring use, and transportation needs, then publish the results. This is not a luxury. It is a practical way to give students time, quiet, and support when they need them most.

Accept answers that identify a specific structural choice and explain its effect on the council audience or persuasive purpose. For the open response, accept varied topics if the response meets the word count and required syntax choices while clearly addressing a school board.
