### From Landscape to City

- ① British Romanticism, which flourished around 1798 to 1832, often treats nature as a source of insight rather than mere scenery. In “Tintern Abbey,” William Wordsworth revisits a landscape and recalls how it has shaped his mind over time. His blank verse, reflective first-person voice, and long, flowing sentences imitate thought in motion. The poem’s speaker seeks a lasting relationship among memory, the natural world, and moral feeling. Romantic writers often valued emotion, imagination, and the individual’s inner life.
- ② American Realism emerged after the Civil War and focused on recognizable social conditions, regional speech, and pressures on ordinary people. Mark Twain’s *The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn* follows Huck down the Mississippi River as he questions rules taught by a slaveholding society. Huck’s plain, vernacular narration and comic exaggeration create satire, exposing the gap between public respectability and private cruelty. Unlike Wordsworth’s meditative lyric speaker, Twain uses a restless journey and colloquial voice to test conscience against custom.
- ③ Early twentieth-century Modernism responded to rapid urban change, war, and uncertainty by breaking from smooth, orderly forms. In “The Love Song of J. Alfred Prufrock,” T. S. Eliot presents an anxious urban speaker whose questions and quotations interrupt one another. Fragmented images, abrupt shifts, and allusions make readers experience his hesitation and isolation. Like Wordsworth, Eliot explores inner life, but his city offers no stable healing landscape. Unlike Twain’s direct vernacular narrator, Eliot’s densely layered voice leaves meaning unsettled, a defining Modernist effect.

**PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)**

All three works examine a person trying to judge the world around them. Wordsworth's flowing blank verse turns a remembered landscape into moral renewal, while Twain's vernacular journey exposes injustice beneath social rules. Eliot's fragments and interruptions make Prufrock's city feel more confining than Wordsworth's natural setting. These differences show Romantic trust in nature, Realist attention to social custom, and Modernist uncertainty.
