Mina's Paper Boat

- ① Mina carried a paper boat to the park after rain. A wide puddle covered the path. Plink, plink, drops tapped the boat's roof. Mina stopped. Could her tiny boat sail across the puddle?
- ② She set the boat at the edge. It bobbed once, then twice. The dark water swirled around it like a slow, hungry snake. Mina pulled her hand back. "I should not let it go," she whispered.
- ③ Then a yellow leaf floated by, turning gently in the water. Mina watched it reach the other side. She smiled and gave her boat a little push. "Sail, little boat, sail!" The boat danced across the puddle.

#	QUESTION	ANSWER
1	The author says the water was like “a slow, hungry snake.” What feeling does this comparison give you?	It makes the puddle seem scary or dangerous.
2	How does the author show that Mina changes her mind about the boat? Use details from the text.	At first, Mina pulls her hand back and says she should not let it go. Later, she smiles and gives the boat a push.
3	Why does the author repeat the word “sail” when Mina pushes the boat?	The repeated word makes the moment feel happy and excited, showing that Mina wants the boat to go.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

__Rrrr__! Thunder rolled above Eli's tent. The sky was as black as ink, so Eli zipped the tent door and stayed inside. He listened to the rain drum on the roof.
