YOUR JOB Underline the two short sentences on the sign. Circle the polite request to the teacher, then number the two sentences for the bottle's owner 1 and 2.

Maya's Lost Bottle Messages

- ① Maya finds a blue water bottle by the swings. She wants its owner to find it. She writes a sign for children near the playground gate. On the sign, she prints, “Lost bottle. Look here!”
- ② Next, Maya writes a note to her teacher. It says, “Could you please put this bottle on the lost-and-found table?” Then she adds, “It has a rocket sticker.” She folds the note and carries it to her teacher.
- ③ Finally, Maya makes a message for the bottle's owner. “Is this your blue bottle with a rocket sticker?” she writes. “Come to Room 12 after recess.” She puts this message in the school newsletter.

#	QUESTION	ANSWER
1	How is the playground sign's sentence structure different from the teacher note's first sentence?	The sign has two short sentences, "Lost bottle. Look here!" The teacher note is one polite question and request.
2	Why does Maya use the question "Is this your blue bottle with a rocket sticker?" in the newsletter?	The question helps the owner check whether the bottle belongs to them.
3	Who is the sentence "Come to Room 12 after recess" for, and what does it ask that reader to do?	It is for the bottle's owner. It asks the owner to come to Room 12 after recess.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)
