A Note for Garden Helpers

- ① Hello, new garden helpers! Our class garden has tiny carrot seeds in the soft soil. Walk on the wood path, not the garden beds. Your careful feet keep the small plants safe while they begin to grow.
- ② Bring your little watering can to the blue barrel. Fill it halfway, so it is easy to carry. Pour water slowly around each plant. Stop when the soil looks dark and damp, not muddy.
- ③ If you see a ladybug, let it crawl on the leaves. Ladybugs may eat insects that hurt plants. When you finish, place tools in the red tub. Thank you for helping our garden grow!
