A Talk Near the Flowers

- ① At the school garden, Maya spoke to the first graders about a tiny bee. She smiled and held her hands close together. In a soft, slow voice, she said, "This bee is small, so let us watch it quietly."
- ② Then Maya pointed to bright flowers across the path. Her voice became louder and quicker. She opened her arms wide and said, "Look at the colors! Bees visit flowers to collect nectar and pollen."
- ③ Before the group left, Maya slowed down again. She put one finger to her lips and used a quiet voice. "Walk gently near the flowers," she said. "We can help bees by giving them space."

3	How does Maya change her voice before the group leaves, and why is that a good choice?	She slows down and uses a quiet voice to tell the group to walk gently near the flowers and give bees space.
