What Is an Owl Pellet?

- ① Many people think owls chew their food like people do. Owls usually swallow small prey whole. Later, an owl regurgitates a pellet. A pellet is a small bundle of bones, fur, and other parts the owl cannot digest.
- ② You may have seen an owl pellet in a classroom. It may look like animal poop, but it is not poop. The text gives a different idea. A pellet comes back out of an owl's mouth after the owl digests what it can.
- ③ The text tells what is inside a pellet, but it does not tell how long an owl takes to make one. A book or safe website could help you learn that. New facts can change or add to what you know.
