YOUR JOB Underline words that tell who will read Omar's poster, and circle the picture or words he chose for those readers. These clues show how he wrote for his audience.

Omar's Rain Garden Poster

- ① Ms. Lee asked Omar to make a poster about the new rain garden. It would hang by the playground gate, where kindergarten classes lined up each morning. Omar wanted young readers to understand why they should stay on the path.
- ② He drew a large picture of boots beside the path. He used short sentences: "Walk here." "Let plants grow." He chose these words because busy children could see and read them quickly before heading outside.
- ③ At recess, a first-grade class stopped at the poster. Nia pointed to the boots and read, "Walk here." Her friends followed the path instead of stepping on the wet soil. Omar saw that his poster helped its readers.
