- ① Welcome to Maple Pond! Ducks swim, rest, and search for food near the water. Stay on the path and use quiet feet. When you watch from far away, the ducks can feel safe.
- ② Ducks need healthy food. Bread is not healthy for ducks, so do not toss it into the pond. Keep your snack in your bag. You may watch a duck dip its bill under water.
- ③ Before you leave, put wrappers and bottles in the bin by the gate. A clean pond gives ducks a safer place to live. Thank you for helping care for this special spot.

2	Who is this sign written for? Give one word or phrase from the sign that shows it.	People visiting Maple Pond. Answers may include "your snack," "Before you leave," or "Thank you for helping."
3	What does the writer want readers to do, and why?	The writer wants readers to stay on the path, be quiet, avoid feeding ducks bread, and throw away trash so ducks are safe and the pond stays clean.
