### Butterflies in the Garden

- ① Ms. Lee's class wanted to learn why monarch butterflies visit the school garden. First, they read a library book. The book said monarchs drink nectar from flowers. The class connected this fact to the purple coneflowers near the fence.
- ② Next, the class watched a video from a nature center website. The video showed monarchs laying eggs on milkweed plants. This information connected to the garden because the class had planted milkweed in one small bed.
- ③ Then Mr. Ortiz, a garden helper, told the class he saw fewer monarchs after a cold, rainy week. His personal message connected weather to the butterflies they saw. The class used all three sources to understand the garden.

**PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)**

My topic is birds near our school, and a bird book can connect a robin's red chest to a bird I see outside. A bird website can connect a robin's song to sounds in the schoolyard. Our custodian can tell me where robins build nests, connecting a person's observation to our school grounds.
