1	What major challenge does Nia face?	A strong gust snaps a kite stick, so her kite bends and drops into the grass.
2	How does Nia respond after her kite breaks?	She takes the kite to her grandfather, tapes the stick with him, and tries flying it again.
3	How does Nia's response support the story's lesson?	She asks for help and tries again, showing that these actions can solve a hard problem.
