A Monarch Journey

- ① *Each fall, monarch butterflies begin a long trip. Many monarchs in the eastern United States and Canada fly south to mountain forests in central Mexico. They do not make the whole trip in one day. They travel for many days, using the sun and Earth's magnetic field to help guide them. A monarch may rest on a tree branch when rain or strong wind arrives.*
- ② *On the way, monarchs need nectar from flowers. Nectar gives them energy for flying. In spring, a female monarch looks for milkweed leaves because her caterpillars can eat those leaves. People can help by planting native milkweed and flowers that bloom at different times. A garden with no pesticides can be a safer place for monarchs, bees, and other insects.*
- ③ *During winter, thousands of monarchs may gather in the same forest. Their orange and black wings can cover branches like bright leaves. In March, the butterflies begin moving north again. No single monarch completes the full trip south and then back north. New generations continue the journey. Scientists and community members count monarchs to learn whether the population is growing or shrinking.*
