A Busy City Garden

- ① At the city garden, a helper checks each raised bed before the market opens. She spots a beetle on a bean leaf and lets it crawl away. Many beetles eat other small insects, though some chew plants. The helper also sees a robin near the fence. It hops through soft soil, looking for worms and seeds.
- ② Later, children use a map to plan a picnic beside the garden. A rainbow appears after a brief shower, and the path begins to shine. Inside a wooden shed, the group finds a basket of tools. They carry a rake, a hose, and a paper sign. The sign tells visitors to keep the gate closed.
- ③ On Saturday, the garden hosts a music walk. Families pause at each station to hear a short clue, then move to the next bed. One clue asks them to find a purple flower with a long stem. Another points to a tiny snail under a stone. By noon, the visitors have learned how water, sunlight, and careful work help a garden grow.

3	Divide rainbow, inside, and garden into syllables. Then name the type of the first syllable in each word.	rain/bow, rain is a vowel-team syllable; in/side, in is a closed syllable; gar/den, gar is an r-controlled syllable.
4	Find the word beetle. Write its syllable division and name the syllable type of each part.	bee/tle; bee is a vowel-team syllable, and tle is a final consonant-le syllable.
