A Butterfly Stop

- ① Our school can turn one sunny corner into a busy butterfly stop. Monarch butterflies need milkweed, the only plant where monarch mothers lay eggs. They also sip nectar from flowers. A small garden with milkweed and bright blooms can give these orange-and-black travelers food and a place to grow near our playground each spring and summer.
- ② Imagine seeing a striped caterpillar munching a leaf at recess. Imagine a chrysalis hanging like a tiny green jewel. Those surprising sights can happen if students, families, and teachers work together. Bring an empty milk jug for a planter, pull weeds carefully, or help water young plants. Every small action can make a real home for butterflies.
- ③ Please help our garden grow. On Friday, choose one kind act: carry a planter, share seeds, or give five minutes to watering. Your help may seem small, but it can welcome a butterfly searching for a safe stop. Let’s make our school yard a kinder, greener place for living things to visit in every warm season.

1	What picture does the word “busy” create in the phrase “busy butterfly stop”? Why might the author use that word?	It makes the garden seem active and full of butterflies. The author uses it to make the garden sound appealing.
2	Which words directly ask the reader to help? Explain how those words support the author’s purpose.	“Please help our garden grow.” The words directly invite readers to help create the garden.
3	How does repeating “Imagine” at the start of two sentences affect student readers?	It helps readers picture the caterpillar and chrysalis, making the garden sound exciting and interesting.
4	Why does the author list “carry a planter, share seeds, or give five minutes to watering”?	The list gives readers clear, small actions they can take, which makes helping seem possible.
