Book Share Message

- ② Friday morning, the blue bin needs to be full. A full bin means more choices for readers like you. First, look for a book with a cover and pages in good shape. Next, write your name on the donation slip. Then, ask a grown-up to help you carry heavy books. Small steps make the event easy for busy families.

Do not bring books with torn pages, missing covers, or writing on every page. If you cannot donate a book, you can still help by sorting books after school.
