A Night Hike Note

- ① Welcome, Night Hikers! As the sun slips behind the trees, your adventure begins. Bring a flashlight, but point its beam at the path, not at animals. Can you hear crickets rubbing their wings? Walk with your group and use quiet feet. That way, you may spot a rabbit nibbling grass or an owl gliding above you.
- ② Stop at the pond rail. Look for round ripples spreading across the water. A frog may be swimming below the surface. Please keep your hands outside the rail, even if the water sparkles like tiny stars. The rail helps keep you safe, and it lets the pond plants grow without being stepped on. What changes do you notice?
- ③ Before you leave, share one small discovery with a partner. You might say, “I saw a shiny beetle under a log!” Your words can help someone else look closely, too. Put litter in the bin near the gate, and take only memories home. When hikers care for the trail, animals have a calm place to eat, rest, and raise their young.

1	Who is the writer talking to? Give one detail that shows how you know.	The writer is talking to young children on a night hike. The writer uses “you” and gives simple directions, such as walking with a group.
2	What are two goals the writer has for the readers during the hike?	The writer wants readers to explore safely and care for animals and the trail.
3	How do the words about crickets rubbing their wings and water sparkling like tiny stars help the readers?	They help readers imagine the sounds and sights of the night hike, making the experience feel interesting and real.
4	The writer says, “take only memories home.” How does this line fit the writer’s purpose?	It reminds hikers not to take things from the trail, which helps protect the animals and plants.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Welcome, butterfly watchers! Can you spot wings that flash orange, yellow, or blue among the sweet-smelling flowers? Walk slowly and keep your hands away from the butterflies so they can drink nectar.
