A Request for Shade

- ① To: Principal Ruiz. Our playground gets very hot at lunch. The slide and climbing bars can feel too warm to touch on sunny days. Many students wait by the wall instead of playing. We need a cooler place where everyone can move safely. I am writing to ask our school to add two shade sails over the open play area.
- ② Shade sails are large pieces of strong cloth that block some sunlight. They are held up by poles and can cover a wide space. Our school already has poles near the blacktop, so workers may be able to use that area. During a class count last Tuesday, 18 of 24 students chose the small shady spot instead of the sunny field.
- ③ Two shade sails would give more students room to play outside. They could also help adults choose a safer lunch plan when the sun is bright. Please talk with the school council about buying and putting up shade sails this year. If the cost is too high, the council could ask families and local businesses to help raise money.
