The Monarchs' Long Trip

- ① Each fall, many monarch butterflies in eastern North America travel south to mountain forests in central Mexico. In the west, many monarchs spend winter along California's coast. These trips are called migration. A monarch does not make the whole round trip alone. The butterflies that return north in spring are later generations, the children and grandchildren of the butterflies that flew south.
- ② Monarchs use more than bright orange wings to survive. Their caterpillars eat milkweed plants, and adult butterflies drink nectar from many flowers. Milkweed gives caterpillars chemicals that make monarchs taste bad to many birds. Still, some birds can eat monarchs. A reader who knows butterflies drink nectar can add that monarch caterpillars need a different kind of food.
- ③ Scientists are still learning how monarchs find the same winter areas. They know that the sun, an internal body clock, and Earth's magnetic field help guide the butterflies. However, scientists do not know every detail about how these clues work together on a long trip. New tracking tags and careful observations may add answers. This is why readers should keep questions when a text leaves a gap.
