A Monarch's Long Flight

- ① In late summer, monarch butterflies in Canada and the United States begin a long trip south. They cannot survive freezing winter weather. Guided by sunlight and Earth's magnetic field, they fly toward mountain forests in central Mexico. Many stop at flowers for nectar along the way. The butterflies travel during the day and rest when the air turns cool.
- ② At a stop, a monarch lands on a bright flower and drinks nectar through its long, tube-like mouthpart. Its orange wings, crossed with black lines, open and close in the sun. A group may gather in a sheltered grove when rain or strong wind comes. These rests give the butterflies food and safer places to wait.
- ③ After traveling up to 3,000 miles, many monarchs reach Mexico in fall. They cluster on oyamel fir trees, which grow in cool mountain areas. The trees help protect the insects from rain and cold. In spring, the butterflies begin moving north. No single butterfly makes the whole round trip, because new generations continue the journey.
