The Pond Builders

- ① At dusk, a beaver swims through a shallow stream carrying a branch. It places the branch against other sticks, then pats mud around it. The growing pile is called a dam. A dam slows the water. Behind it, water spreads into a pond that is deeper than the stream. The pond gives the beaver a safer place to live.
- ② The pond changes more than the beaver's home. Calm water can give fish, frogs, and ducks places to rest or find food. Near the pond, the beaver may build a lodge from branches and mud. Its entrance is under water, so many land animals cannot easily reach it. In winter, the beaver stays inside the lodge and eats branches stored nearby.
- ③ Beavers do not build dams in every stream. They usually choose places where moving water can be blocked with wood and mud. By making a pond, a beaver creates water deep enough for swimming and for hiding its lodge entrance. The dam, pond, and lodge work together. These parts help the beaver find food, stay safer, and live through cold weather.

1	Look at what you underlined. What is one detail that shows how a dam helps a beaver?	A dam slows water, so water spreads into a deeper pond that gives the beaver a safer place to live.
2	Why did you circle the clue about the lodge entrance being under water?	It shows that the lodge is safer because many land animals cannot easily reach the entrance.
3	After reading all three paragraphs, what is the big idea of the passage?	Beavers use dams, ponds, and lodges together to make a safer home and survive.
4	Write one question you could ask while reading paragraph 3 to check your understanding. Then answer your question with details from the paragraph.	Example: How do the dam, pond, and lodge work together? The dam makes a pond with deep water, and the deep water helps hide the lodge entrance.
