Maya Plans a Flyer

- ① When Maya planned a school garden workday, she first thought about her readers. Families needed to know the date, time, place, and jobs they could do. They might read the message quickly on a phone. Maya chose a short informational flyer instead of a long story. Her purpose was to invite families and give them clear information.
- ② At the top, Maya put a bold heading: "Garden Workday." Next, she listed the date, Saturday, May 10, and the time, 9:00 to 11:00 a.m. Then she added the garden location and a short list of supplies, such as gloves and water bottles. These details were grouped in sections, so families could find important facts fast.
- ③ Last, Maya used a friendly closing: "Bring a neighbor if you can!" She added a phone number for questions. A flyer was the right genre because it shared facts in a quick, easy-to-scan way. If Maya were writing about why gardens matter, she could choose an opinion letter with reasons. She changed the genre and structure to match a different purpose.
