Mia Revises a Garden Article

- ① Mia wrote a short article about the school garden. Her first draft began, "The garden is nice. We grow things there." Ms. Lee wrote, "Tell readers what they will see and why the garden matters." Mia saw that her opening gave too little information. She changed it to, "Our school garden grows food for the cafeteria and bright flowers for bees."
- ② Next, Mia changed the order of her facts. She moved the sentence about planting seeds before the sentence about picking tomatoes. This made the steps easier to follow. Her partner, Jonah, also said that the word good did not tell much. Mia replaced good with crunchy to describe the carrots. She added the detail that bees visit the yellow flowers.
- ③ Finally, Mia read the article aloud to her group. They could understand the facts, but they wanted a stronger ending. One student suggested ending with a question to invite readers to visit. Mia wrote, "What vegetable would you like to grow in our garden?" She checked that each change matched her purpose, which was to teach classmates about the garden and make them curious.
