Family Science Night

- ① [Picture: a child holding a magnet near paper clips] Come to Maple School on Thursday, May 14, from 6:00 to 7:30 p.m. Try short experiments with light, sound, and magnets. Children can test ideas at each table, and adults can help them talk about what they notice. This free event is for students and the adults who care for them.
- ② Look for the blue star on signs around school. The star points toward the gym, where the event will be held. A clock picture beside “6:00” shows when families should arrive. At the welcome table, pick up a simple map. The map uses arrows and room names so visitors can find the light station, the sound station, and the magnet station.
- ③ Please bring your questions and a reusable water bottle. Families may take home a small magnet activity sheet, so adults can keep exploring with children after the event. You do not need to know science words before you come. The flyer says, “Ask, test, and discover together!” These friendly words invite families to join in and make the night feel welcoming.
