The Empty Lot Meeting

- ① On Tuesday evening, the town library held a meeting about the empty lot on Pine Street. Ten-year-old reporter Maya Chen came to take notes for the school newspaper. She wanted to tell students what neighbors thought. The meeting happened after the town received money to improve one public space. Several families, shop owners, and children filled the room.
- ② Maya's article began, "A garden could make our block brighter," said Mr. Ortiz, who owns a nearby bakery. He spoke because he hoped people would visit the street and his shop. Then Jayla, a third grader, said, "I want a place to climb and swing after school." Jayla looked at the lot as a child who needed a safe place to play.
- ③ After the meeting, Maya wrote that both ideas could help the town. She did not choose one plan because her job was to report different views fairly. Her article was printed before the town council voted. Readers could use the speakers' reasons to understand why the same empty lot meant different things to different people.
