A Garden for Butterflies

- ① Last spring, Ms. Lee's class planned a butterfly garden beside the playground. The students wanted to give butterflies food and a safe place to rest. First, they learned that butterflies drink nectar from flowers. They also found out that caterpillars need certain leaf plants to eat. These facts helped the class choose what to grow in their garden that year.
- ② Next, the class prepared the garden bed. They pulled weeds so new plants would have room to grow. Then they mixed compost into the soil to add nutrients. Each team planted flowers in sunny spots and leaf plants nearby. Finally, students watered the young plants. The steps worked together to make a place where butterflies could find what they need.
- ③ Soon, the garden began to change. Green leaves spread across the bed, and flower buds opened. Butterflies visited the flowers to sip nectar. The class watched carefully and wrote down what they saw. Because the garden had both flowers and leaf plants, it could support butterflies at different stages of life. The class's planning, planting, and watching formed one complete project.
