A kindergarten class was lining up nearby. One child pointed to a blue lunchbox resting by the water fountain. Its silver handle sparkled brightly in the warm sun.
- ③ Finally, Nia thanked the child and carried her lunchbox to the cafeteria. She still had time to eat before math class. Nia learned that hurrying can cause problems, so she planned to put her lunchbox in her backpack after recess. The next day, she played tag again, but her lunchbox stayed in class all day.
