Maya slowed down and looked at every tide pool. A plastic ring hid under wet seaweed. She lifted it with her grabber and placed it in her bag. "The beach needs our help," she said.
- ③ By noon, Maya's class had filled twelve bags with trash. The clean shore seemed to smile at them. Maya was on cloud nine as she watched a heron lift into the bright sky. Mr. Ortiz thanked the class, and Maya waved goodbye. She hoped the beach would stay safe for crabs, birds, and people all summer.

1	What two things are compared in the simile "Waves raced to shore like playful dogs"? What picture does this comparison create?	The waves are compared to playful dogs. The comparison shows the waves moving quickly and energetically.
2	In paragraph 1, what does "Her bucket was hungry" mean? How does this metaphor make the bucket seem?	It means the bucket was ready to collect lots of trash. The metaphor makes the bucket seem eager.
3	What does the idiom "Keep your eyes peeled" mean in paragraph 2? Why does Mr. Ortiz use it?	It means watch very carefully. Mr. Ortiz uses it to help students notice litter near the tide pools.
4	What does "on cloud nine" mean in paragraph 3? What does it show about Maya?	It means very happy. It shows that Maya feels happy about the cleanup.
