The Empty Lot

- ② Her neighbor Mr. Lee stepped outside with a broom. "I can help," he said. Maya smiled, but then she saw trash tucked under wet leaves. She wanted to quit, yet she remembered the bright tomatoes in her grandmother's yard. "Let's start with one corner," Maya said. She handed Mr. Lee a pair of gloves from the box.
- ③ By noon, two children from the building joined them. Maya showed them how to pull weeds without tearing the tiny green sprouts. Soon, three bags of trash stood by the fence. The lot still looked rough, but a clear patch of soil waited near the gate. Maya wiped her forehead and grinned. "Next week, we plant," she said.

1	Which details in paragraph 1 help you picture the setting? Explain what they show.	Details such as the empty lot, puddles, bent fence, and muddy ground show that the place is wet, messy, and uncared for.
2	How does the dialogue between Maya and Mr. Lee show their ideas about the lot?	Maya says the lot could be a garden, and Mr. Lee says he can help. Their dialogue shows that they want to improve the lot together.
3	What thought shows that Maya almost gives up? How does her memory help the plot move forward?	Maya wants to quit when she sees the trash. Remembering her grandmother's tomatoes helps her decide to keep working.
4	How do Maya's actions help move the plot from the beginning to the end?	Maya brings seeds, starts cleaning with Mr. Lee, shows others how to pull weeds, and plans to plant next week. Her actions change the lot from messy to ready for a garden.
