The Bent Stem

2	How does Grandpa's dialogue help change Maya's understanding of the problem?	Grandpa points out that the roots are still covered, helping Maya understand that the plant may survive.
3	Which two setting details make the problem feel stormy and difficult?	Dark clouds cover the sun, and a strong gust knocks the pot from Maya's hands. The wet path also adds to the stormy setting.
4	What does Maya's plan to place a stake tomorrow show about her at the end of the story?	It shows that Maya has hope that the tomato plant will grow.
