Beaver Dams at Work

- ① Text 1: A park ranger watched a beaver family on Pine Creek. The beavers carried branches and packed mud between them to make a dam. After the dam was built, the rushing creek spread into a quiet pond. The ranger saw ducks floating there and frogs calling near the edge. She also noticed that the pond gave the beavers a safer place to swim to their lodge.
- ② Text 2: A science article explains that beaver dams slow the water in a creek. When water moves slowly, bits of soil and sand can settle to the bottom instead of washing away. The pond behind a dam can also fill a wide area beside the creek. This wet area gives water-loving plants a place to grow, creating a wetland.
- ③ Text 2, continued: The article adds that wetlands made by beavers can help many animals. Fish may find calmer water, and insects can live among the plants. Birds and other animals may use the pond for food or shelter. The ranger's notes show what happened at one creek, while the article explains why the pond changed the land and how that change can help living things.

1	What important idea do both texts share about a beaver dam? Use one detail from each text in your answer.	Both texts show that a beaver dam changes a fast-moving creek into slower, calmer water. Text 1 says the rushing creek became a quiet pond, and Text 2 says dams slow creek water.
2	How does Text 2 add information to the ranger's notes in Text 1?	Text 1 describes what the ranger saw at Pine Creek. Text 2 explains that slow water lets soil and sand settle and can create a wetland where plants grow.
3	Text 1 names ducks and frogs, while Text 2 names fish, insects, and birds. What do these details together show about the pond?	They show that the pond and wetland can provide a habitat with food, shelter, or calmer water for many kinds of animals.
4	Why is it useful to read both texts instead of only the ranger's notes?	The ranger's notes give an example of what happened at one creek, while the science article explains why dams change water and land and how the changes can help living things.
