A Garden for Our School

- ① Our school should plant a small native-flower garden beside the playground. Native flowers are plants that grow naturally in our area. I support this garden because it could give bees and butterflies food. Many pollinators drink nectar from flowers, and some butterflies lay eggs on certain native plants. A garden could help students notice these animals during recess.
- ② First, the garden could save water compared with a lawn patch. After native plants have grown roots, many need less extra watering than plants from wetter places. Their roots can also help hold soil in place when rain falls. This is a useful reason to choose native flowers instead of planting only grass in that space.
- ③ Finally, students could use the garden for science learning. A student can watch a bee move from flower to flower and sketch what happens. The garden would give classes a real place to ask questions about seeds, insects, and weather. For these reasons, I believe a native-flower garden is a smart choice for our school.
