Firefly Evening

They shimmer near my waiting feet, And make the dark feel warm and sweet.
- ② Near the old oak, friends tiptoe slow, Their jars stay open, wide, and clear. We watch the blinking lights that glow, Then let each little guest fly near. No hands can hold a moving spark, No jar should keep it from the sky. The lights turn on across the park, Like tiny winks that pass us by.
- ③ When moonlight paints the path with gray, We head for home at end of day. The fireflies flash a bright goodbye, Their yellow lamps still fill the sky. Tomorrow, when the sun is high, The field will look so plain and green. But nighttime brings a glowing scene. I carry one small wish to bed: May summer lights return instead.
