Roots at the Water's Edge

- ① Along warm coastlines, mangrove trees grow where land meets salty water. Their tangled roots rise above the mud like a wooden maze. At high tide, fish swim among the roots. At low tide, small crabs hurry across the wet ground. Mangroves can live in salty water that would harm many other kinds of trees in the same area.
- ② These forests are busy shelters. How can so many animals live in one forest? Young fish, shrimp, and sea turtles can hide between the roots, where larger animals have trouble following. Birds perch in the branches and search for food. When fallen leaves break down, they become tiny bits that feed many water creatures. Because so many animals use this habitat, scientists sometimes call mangroves a coastal nursery.
- ③ Mangroves also help people who live near the coast. During strong storms, their roots and trunks can slow moving water and reduce some wave energy. The trees hold soil in place, which can limit erosion. However, mangroves need room and healthy water to grow. Protecting them helps keep shorelines and the animals that depend on them healthier.
