| 6 | The noisy crowd at the game.        | <b>FRAGMENT</b> | It names a group but does not tell what the group did.              |
| 7 | Across the muddy field.             | <b>FRAGMENT</b> | It tells where, but it is not a complete thought.                   |
| 8 | Wow, that puzzle was tricky!        | <b>COMPLETE</b> | It has a subject, puzzle, and a predicate, was tricky.              |
