The Dry Books

- ② Then the rain changed from taps to drums. Water rushed along the curb like a tiny river. Maya looked at the dark clouds, then at the dry library book on top. Should she run? If she ran, the pages might get wet. If she stayed, she might miss the bus. She spotted the bright awning of Mr. Lee’s bakery across the street.
- ③ Maya dashed beneath the awning. Safe at last. Mr. Lee held the bakery door open, and warm cinnamon air floated outside. “You can wait here,” he said. Maya smiled and placed the books on a chair far from the door. Soon, the bus splashed to the curb. Maya climbed aboard with dry books, but she kept thinking about the kind baker.

1	How do the repeated words “tap, tap, tap” and the later word “drums” change the way you picture the rain?	They make the rain seem as if it starts gently and then becomes much heavier and louder.
2	Why does the author include the question “Should she run?” followed by two sentences beginning with “If”?	These choices show Maya weighing two problems, helping the reader feel the tension of her decision.
3	What effect does the very short sentence “Safe at last” have after Maya reaches the bakery?	It gives the reader a quick feeling of relief because Maya and the books are out of the rain.
4	Which details help the author show that Mr. Lee is kind? Explain how the details shape your opinion of him.	He holds the door open and lets Maya wait inside. These helpful actions make him seem caring.
