Signals in the Hive

- ① On a warm day, a honeybee may find a patch of flowers far from its hive. Back at the hive, it performs a waggle dance on the honeycomb. The bee moves in a figure-eight pattern while shaking its body. Other worker bees follow the dancer with their antennae to learn about the food source outside.
- ② The dance gives clues about both direction and distance. The angle of the waggle run compared with straight up tells bees the direction of the flowers compared with the sun. A longer waggle run usually means the food is farther away. This information helps the colony send workers to places with nectar and pollen to eat and store.
- ③ A science article includes these observations and explanations so readers can understand a real animal behavior. It does not invent a bee hero, a problem, or dialogue between insects. Those ideas could belong in a fictional story. Instead, this article focuses on how the dance works and why it helps honeybees find food for their colony.

1	What real behavior does the article explain? How does this topic fit a science article?	It explains the honeybee waggle dance. A science article can explain a real animal behavior using facts.
2	Give two details the author includes because this is an informational science article.	Answers may include that the dance is a figure-eight pattern, workers use antennae to follow it, the dance shows direction, or a longer waggle run shows greater distance.
3	Why would a bee hero and dialogue between insects not fit this article's genre?	A bee hero and dialogue are invented story elements. This science article gives facts and explanations about real honeybee behavior.
4	How does the last paragraph help you tell the difference between an informational article and a fictional story?	It says an informational article uses observations and explanations, while a fictional story can include a hero, a problem, and dialogue.
