Make a Simple Rain Gauge

- ① Rain gauges measure how much rain falls. You can make one from a clear, straight-sided plastic bottle. Gather a ruler, waterproof marker, scissors, small stones, tape, and a notebook. Ask an adult to help with the scissors. First, cut off the top of the bottle where it begins to narrow. Turn that top upside down, and tape it inside the bottle like a funnel.
- ② Next, place the stones in the bottom so the bottle will not tip over. Pour in water until it reaches just above the stones. Use the ruler to draw a line at the water level, then add lines every centimeter above it. These lines make a scale. Put the gauge outside in an open spot, away from roofs, trees, and sprinklers, which can add extra water.
- ③ After a rainstorm, look at the water level and read the number beside it. Write the amount and the date in your notebook. Then empty the bottle so it is ready for the next storm. Check the gauge at about the same time after each rainstorm. A chart with dates and amounts can help you compare rainy days over several weeks.

3	Why is the information about placing the gauge outside in the second paragraph instead of the first paragraph?	The gauge must be made and marked with a scale before it is placed outside.
4	Why does this text use ordered actions instead of a paragraph of facts about rain gauges?	It is teaching the reader how to make and use a rain gauge, so the actions need to be in order.
